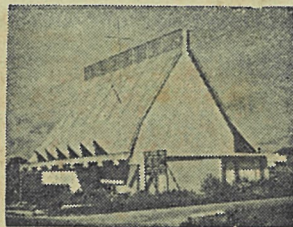

### WHAT'S THIS ABOUT A COFFEE HOUSE?

Some of you will have heard hints, during recent months, of an idea to open a coffee house at Trinity, and you may have wondered what it was all about. You have probably said to yourself, What has a coffee house to do with the life of a Methodist congregation? Let me try to set you in the picture.

The idea grew out of the District Seminar organised by the Commission on Christian Social Concerns in September last year, to consider "Christian Participation in the Campaign against Drug Abuse." A number of speakers at that seminar had emphasised the important social problems which appear to underlie much of the drug scene. Local drug abusers are more likely to come from homes where there is little security or understanding, and to be found among lonely young people trying to find some group to which they can feel they belong.

Faced with the question, What can concerned Christians do to help people like this? two suggestions made an impression on some of our Trinity young people who were present. First, the challenge thrown out to the Church to become the kind of warm, accepting, 'open' community that it ought to be, from which no person need feel himself excluded; and secondly, the criticism levelled against so many churches, that the buildings they possess are under-used, and (one might say) selfishly used for the church's own private purposes. Might not our premises, it was suggested, be used as a place where lonely young people could meet each other in an environment healthier than the street-corner 'gang'.

Hence the idea of the coffee-house. We looked at our own premises - still very limited until this year's Extension plans can

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 WEDNESDAY EVENING TRAINING COURSE  
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Under the leadership of the pastor and Madam Khor Peck Hoon, a weekly Training Course under the title: "PREPARING TO HELP PEOPLE" is being conducted each Wednesday night at 41, Taman Serangoon.

The course, which is being attended by twenty five persons (two thirds of them of M.Y.F. age), began on 13 February and will continue until 17 April, omitting the Wednesday night in Holy Week when the church will be holding one of its Passiontide services. It is designed to make us more effective in dealing helpfully with needy and anxious people, by fostering an awareness of the ways in which people relate to one another. There are talks, discussion and role-playing in small groups, through which we are gradually making some progress in our ability to put ourselves in somebody else's place and see things from their point of view.

Many of us are very fond of telling other people what they ought to do. We say, "If I were you, I would do this or that ..." when what we really mean is "If you were me, you would do this or that ...", which is a very different matter. We find it almost impossible to restrain ourselves from giving advice or from expressing ourselves very forcibly on the subject of right and wrong! On the other hand, because we want to be helpful and have sensitive consciences, people can easily make us feel guilty by making demands upon us that we are unable to meet.

The training class is helping us to discover, not only how other people are likely to react, but a good deal also about our own needs and hang-ups. It is valuable to have a group like this in which all of us can participate. This class is now full and we will not be able to accept any more members; but perhaps, if needed, we can organise something similar at a later date. Topics dealt with are:-

VETERANS OF THE CROSS SUNDAY on 3rd March is a day when we remember retired pastors, many of whom have given long years of service to the Methodist Church. At the last meeting of the Singapore Malaysia Annual Conference, the rate for the pension paid to retired pastors was raised after the Annual Budget had been approved. The Communion Offering on this Sunday will therefore be given to the Pastors' Pension Fund. Please give generously! You may not know that a retired pastor at present - ~~EVEN AFTER THE INCREASE~~ - only receives \$4 per month for every year of service. (i.e. after 25 years in the ministry, he will receive a pension of \$100 per month). We hope you will not only give generously, but also start looking for ways and means of increasing this tiny sum - which is pitiful in these days of spiralling prices!

#### LEADERSHIP TRAINING

A group of about twenty persons met in the Basement on the 16th February for an afternoon of Leadership Training under the guidance of Rev. Denver Stone from Kuala Lumpur. We were disappointed at the attendance, especially after the rigours of a long-delayed train journey which Mr Stone had had to face. Only one representative turned up from the other Singapore churches to which invitations had been sent. This was a pity, for he had much to teach us - and we have much to learn!

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NEWS IN BRIEF

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+++ The Bangkok Office of the Christian Conference of Asia (CCA) has been closed, following the appointment of our former bishop Dr Yap Kim Hao as General Secretary, and the new headquarters are located in the premises of the Methodist Church, Toa Payoh. Among the CCA Secretariat who will be stationed in Singapore is Mr Lee Soc Jin (Secretary, Communications), the younger son of Mr & Mrs Lee Teck Hock. (CCA News) ++++

+++ Eleven young Christian leaders in Seoul, Korea were arrested on the morning of January 17, on charges of violating the President's decree of January 8, which banned all criticism of the present constitution and advocacy of constitutional revision.

They were arrested shortly after they issued a statement calling for the immediate withdrawal of the President's decree, the freedom to discuss the revision of the constitution and the restoration of democratic order in Korea. This statement was the first of its kind made after the presidential decree. Contents of the statement were not released in any Korean newspaper.

If convicted by a military tribunal, those arrested face a maximum penalty of 13 years imprisonment. (CCA News) ++++

+++ EXPLO' 74 - Preparations for EXPLO' 74 - the International Training Congress on Evangelism in Seoul, Korea from August 13-18 are now well advanced. The closing date for registration has been extended to 17 March, and those interested in the possibility of attending the Congress should contact Victor Goh or Ivy Yap, or Chan Chong Hiok.

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be completed - and wondered about the possibility of applying a little imagination and a coat of paint or two, so that the basement could be transformed into a little coffee-house each Saturday night - with small tables and attractive cloths, suitable lighting (or even suitable gloom!) and the sort of music young people enjoy and appreciate - a place that would be open to young people in the estate who might care to drop in for coffee or a cold drink, biscuits too perhaps.

Whenever it was open, we thought, we would have four or more committed young people from the church who would be available to talk to any lonely person, and to be talked to by anybody who wanted to talk; sensitive young people, with a deep, Christ-given concern for others, not trying to proselytize or pressure them, and certainly not wanting to exploit another's need or loneliness, but ready and able to get alongside them and be their friends. There might well be the opportunity sometimes to speak directly of their faith, if that was what the other wanted to do - but there would always be opportunities for being (if it doesn't sound too pious) Christ-centred, Christ-directed friends.

We would need other young people (some of the younger ones, maybe) to do the serving; and we would need, each night the coffee house was open, at least a couple of dedicated, equipped older members, to accept the responsibility of general oversight of what was going on, and to be available, hopefully, to do more counselling type of work if this should ever be needed.

We recognised some of the problems involved, and we talked these over in the Outreach Committee. To open our doors to all kinds of people that we do not know means accepting the risk that an invitation might be abused. It would mean facing the fact that our young people, participating in the project, would be brought into contact with others of whom their parents might not approve - with all the risks that this could involve. It would mean proper control and supervision of what was going on each Saturday night, and during the week, and drawing up some fairly clear guide lines, which would allow maximum effectiveness as a genuine 'meeting-point' and yet give adequate protection to all those involved.

Most of all, we recognised that the project could never succeed, unless the congregation as a whole was prepared, with open eyes, to undertake a completely new kind of outreach, and to accept the uncertainties which any new venture such as this must entail. We hope therefore that you will complete the enclosed questionnaire, and give us your honest reaction to the idea.
