PACTOR'S MESSAGE

SUPERSTAR, EXORCISM - AND THE CENSOR

It must be said at the outset that what follows is the expfession of one person's point of view, and is intended to stimulate, not agreement but responsible decision. There are bigger battles to be fought by Christian men and women than those over what films should be shown to the cinema-public of Singapore. And it would be illogical and invidious to get noisily hot under the collar about a couple of items that seem to touch ourselves a little more closely than most, when we remain blithely silent about all kinds of other rubbish which is the normal diet of the film fans. But since some questions have been publicly raised about the decisions of the Board of Film Censors in relation to "Jesus Christ - Superstar" and "The Exorcist", we ought to be prepared to make up our own minds.

First, we need to remember that both items are available in other forms in the Republic - 'Superstar' on records, 'Exorcist' as a paperback. How much do we want to ban? And who shall decide where the line should be drawn?

Second, it is hard to understand why "Superstar" has been excluded. Some of the music is pretty pedestrian (not least that rather dreadful 'theme' excerpt played by our school brass bands during the recent inter-schools contest organised by the Ministry of Education) but it has its moments — even for an old man like me. Its theology, of course, is totally inadequate; but then it does not claim to be a 'Christian' piece or a proclamation of the gospel. And I wonder whether its theology is much less adequate than that of some of its most vocal critics. A newspaper reporter told me that some of the 'Christian leaders' had complained that the film made our Lord "too human"; and behind that comment I see lurking one of the oldest dangers to Christian thinking. 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disturbingly, successful film, in which the personification of man's dark side occurs in such vivid and real form that the film becomes a psychological experience rather than an entertainment. Some viewers have been vocally - and sometimes physically - revolted by it.

A small child turns into a vicious monster. A joyous and innocent face transforms into a raging vomit of filth and degradation that bolts out to cover herself and those about her. She develops strength after strength to violate all who come within her reach. Blasphemies and obscenities burst forth in conjunction with unctuous, slimy evil. Modern sckentific methods fail to help, and in desperation her mother turns to the Church for an exorcism. In perhaps the only intellectually provocative line in the film, says one reviewer, when the priest to whom she turns responds that he might help the child 'as a psychiatrist', she explodes at him: "She doesn't need a psychiatrist - she needs a priest! Jesus Christ, won't somebody help me?"

The question is well taken! The Church of our time has been tempted often to sell out to humanistic psychology when confronted by the fact of human evil. Psychiatry can help cure many types of mental and emotional sickness; counselling skills are an important part of any Christian ministry; but the mother in the film reminds us that we have more to offer than just this.

The trouble with the film is not that it does not raise a proper question, but that the author has lumped together on to one girl-victim every possible symptom from every case he had ever read about. The result is overwhelming, obviously alarming and, at the last, preposterous. Unfortunately many film-goers are not critical enough of what they are watching to avoid getting hurt.

I share this 'WARNING FOR PARENTS' from a balanced Christian reviewer: "Children whose parents were unwise enough to take them to this film have sometimes reacted with hysteria. I myself was greatly disturbed after viewing it. Frankly this is a rip-your-guts-out-lick-them-off-the-table film. If that sounds repulsive, then you have the idea...Even with a parent this film is too disturbing for the average adolescent who is trying to deal with positive and negative behaviour eruptions, who is trying, often desperately, to gain some control over himself and come to grips with outside forces over which he has no control. This comes too close to the teen-ager's already-existing psychic fears...At least see it yourself before your son or daughter does, if you are still unconvenced."

I do not think we need to be over-defensive. It has always been a fundamental part of orthodox Christian faith to affirm that Jesus was 'truly man', 'perfect man'. This was his mother Mary's first experience of him; this was where the apostles began in their relationship with him; this real humanity is the solid ground from which all our thinking about Jesus must start. "The Word was made flesh"; "Jesus Christ is come in the flesh". But so often in the history of the Church, we have de-humanised him. In our time we know that humanness is inescapeably 'sexual' - we are male and female, as the book of Genesis taught us long ago. This is part of what it means to be a person. Whatever we may feel about our Lord's 'masculinity', would it be surprising if the strong character which challenged fishermen to leave their work proved extremely attractive to the women in his company? If this is so, why do we have to get up-tight about Magdalene's love-song. for example?

What transformed the disciples' understanding of Jesus was the experience of meeting him "risen from the dead". Some complain that "Superstar" has no hint of the resurrection; it ends with the crucifixion. Where else can the story end, except for Christian faith? Dead and done for - Judas and the priests triumphed - a good man destroyed by this wicked world; what is there more to say, until the Easter experience (not the Easter theory). Just as we begin discovering the divinity of Jesus by starting with the Man, so we begin discovering the meaning of the resurrection by facing the fact of a dead man on a cross. The Christian message begins with the down-to-earth-ness of "Superstar" - why be afraid of it? - but it does not end there.

We do not need to protect Jesus. He is alive enough to look after himself. As Dorothy Sayers once put it in her play "The Zeal of thy House":

And can defend His honour, being full-grown
In wisdom and in stature. We need not
Play nursemaid to the Babe of Bethlehem
To shield Him from the harlot and the thief,
Or keep those tender, innocent hands from harm
That bear the sharp nails' imprint, and uphold
The axis of the spheres....

The other film, which the Censor allowed, seems potentially much more damaging. By all accounts, "The Exorcist" is a horrifyingly, (continued on page 6)
