PASTOR'S MESSAGE

PURPOSEFULLY AHEAD !

A congregation needs a clear sense of direction if the great investment of time, energy and ability made by its members is not to run to waste. Many people - be they never so dedicated! - pulling in many different directions simply get in each other's way, tread on each other's toes, limit each other's achievement, and make it impossible to feel that all of us are moving forward purposefully together. We need to set common objectives for the church.

First, of course, we need to discover a common commitment. The church is not our own, it is Christ's, and until all our work and worship and service expresses the complete, whole-hearted dedication of each of us to the one Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, we shall remain a stunted, limited and rather bewildered human organisation, saying one thing and doing another, and running frantically around in circles is a desperate search for the meaning of its own existence. We do not become a live congregation of Christ's Church by simply doing more things; "the branch cannot bear fruit of itself unless it abide in the Vine". Our first objective must be to go on saying, as clearly and continually as we can, "I beseech you ... be reconciled to God" (II Cor. 5:20). Our congregational life is our glad response to the discovery of God's love in Jesus Christ.

Then we have to begin to work out in detail what that means. If we do not do this, our commitment begins to dry up because it has no outlet or expression, apart from spasmodic bursts of activity. This is why the Inaugural Meeting of the Church Executive Committee spent the Hari Raya Holiday trying to set realistic, achievable goals for

Among the important items to be considered at the Singapore Malaya Annual Conference, when it meets at Port Dickson from 16th to 20th November, will be the Report of the Committee on Restructure set up by the last General Conference of the Methodist Church.

We understand that this proposes the establishment of two General Conferences, one for Singapore and one for Malaysia. The former will comprise three Annual Conferences, composed of the Singapore components of the C.A.C., the S.M.A.C. and the T.P.A.C. The latter will have five Annual Conferences, with the addition of the two (Chinese and Iban) Conferences from Sarawak.

We also understand that, instead of having as now one Bishop with five Presidents, it is proposed that each Annual Conference will elect its own Bishop (or President), one of whom shall be elected by his fellow-bishops to preside over the General Conference. It is hoped that this Council of Bishops would provide a unifying link within the diverse constituent parts of the Church.

In the new General Conferences, the principle will be mainained that, regardless of size, each Annual Conference will have an equal number of representatives, though this is to be reviewed after one quadrennium. District and Local Conferences will become permissive rather than obligatory. Church property will be the subject of negotiation by a sub-committee of the Restructure Committee. If all Annual Conferences accept these proposals this year, Consitutional amendments and legislation will be drafted for ratification by Annual Conferences in 1975, followed by a General Conference in 1976.

There is no space to discuss these proposals here, but it may be doubted whether the primary virtue of this scheme is more streamlined efficiency!

this Conference year, goals which are wide enough to involve every
church member and yet precise enough to allow progress to be monitored throughout the year. Too many church plans flounder because
there is no adequate follow-up; decisions are made and then forgotten; splendid ideals never shape themselves into practical
action and noble emotions die unexpressed.

The L.C.E.C. sees two main objectives for the year. The first is to realise the Extension plans, through a re-activated and energetic fund-raising campaign. Mr Andrew Lee is the Chairman of the responsible committee. The second (which becomes also the theme of the Church Retreat on the Deepavali holiday, 13 November) is to fulfil the mission of the congregation.

Most of the brain-storming session centred round the second objective, because the L.C.E.C. had no doubts about necessity of the first. Under this broad aim, four subsidiary goals were identified:

a. to deepenthe fellowship among the members of the church (and to integrate into the congregation those friends who are now part of our worshipping body)

b. to train members for Christian witness, so that we may all feel that we can share the faith that is in us.

c. to develop a programme of lay-visitation, so that the congregation may discover itself as a community of pastoral care (for we are responsible for each other).

d. to develop a team of evangelistic lay visitors, to be be the spearhead of outreach by the congregation into the new communities growing up around us.

These objectives now become the basic framework within which we shall operate as a congregation. All the sectional committees and organizations have been given the responsibility of breaking these objectives into specific targets, with intermediate target-dates built into their programme for the year, with the L.C.E.C. supervising their progress as the months go by.

Some steps have already been taken to implement this overall programme. A Leadership Training Course, led by Victor Goh, is meeting each Sunday afternoon for the next few weeks, and another kind of Training Course for Coffee House Befrienders is also under way. Different in approach and method, but both concerned to share the life which Christ gives, they indicate what variety is possible within a disciplined, purposeful programme.
