#### THE NAME OF THE NAMELESS



REPORT ON THE 7TH SESSION OF SINGAPORE—MALAYA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Annual Conference, which met at Port Dickson from 16 to 20 November, 1974 was well-attended and the sessions were lively and constructive. Singapore District was well represented with approximately ten ministers and twenty laymen attending from the ten churches. Toa Payoh, which has not yet attained Local Conference status, had no lay representative.

On the first evening of the Conference, Holy Communion was celebrated with Bishop Doraisamy preaching. All delegates and observers attended this very moving service, and the offering taken was donated to retired pastors and their families for the coming Christmas season. Our pastor Rev. Smith was given the honour of conducting the morning worship services throughout the Conference.

In his presidential address, Rev. Denis Dutton, who was later re-elected for a further period of two years as President, stressed the importance of research before embarking on important projects, so that our existing resources can be utilised more effectively.

Mr Peter Lai chaired the Conference Workshop of Administration, and Rev. Smith and Philip Chan chaired the Workshop on Outreach. Mr Lai was elected to the Conference Executive Board and Mr Daniel Gwee was chosen to serve on the Board of Pensions. Rev Patrick Yeoh, who was at one time attached to our church when he was a student, was ordained and later appointed District Superintendent of the new South Eastern District. Mr Andrew Lee continues as chairman of the Board of Missions.

Rev. Denver Stone was appointed to serve as pastor of Trinity from June 1975, when Mr Smith will be returning to U.K. with his family. Rev. Sam Goh was appointed pastor at Paya Lebar, following Dr George Wan who becomes full-time Secretary of Evangelism.

#### two General Conferences

Conference reiterated its acceptance of the fundamental principle that two General Conferences be formed, one for Singapore and one for Malaysia. The proposals of the Re-structure Committee were voted on item by item (there were 16 items in all) and most of the proposals relating to administration and finance of the General Conferences were accepted, though there were clearly different emphases in the Malaysian and Singaporean viewpoints. It is hoped that all the other Annual Conferences will vote in a similar way,



continued from page 3) for a two-thirds majority of those present and voting is necessary for the proposals to be adopted.

The Conference Budget for 1974-75 is \$ 174,000, with 34% going to outreach and 27% to administration, the two major items. The smaller and poorer churches will now be able to apply for loans, once rules have been drawn up by the Board of Finance regarding the use of contingency funds which are at present untapped.

#### workshop reports

The Workshop on Teaching recommended that counselling services be provided in all our schools which do not have them now. The Workshop on Outreach recommended that church premises be made available as study centres and meeting places for young people. It also proposed that a full-time co-ordinator be appointed to co-ordinate the work of the Boards of Evangelism, Missions and Social Concerns. The Workshop on Youth & Adult Work recommended the appointment of a full-time Director of Youth Work, and Miss Chia Nyoke Lin, Christian Education worker, was appointed to this post. The Workshop on Administration recommended the formation of 5 Districts (4 in West Malaysia and 1 in Singapore) to lessen the burden placed on some District Superintendents.

#### local finance

The new Pastors' Salary Scheme was referred back to local churches for decision at the First Local Conference. If the required votes are received this time, the scale will be implemented as from 1 January 1975. A proposal from the floor that poorer churches be given the opportunity of applying for subsidies, provided they submit their accounts for verification, was unanimously agreed. It is poped that this will encourage poorer churches to accept this scheme.

It was unanimously resolved that all Conference Boards submit audited accounts to the Executive Board within three months of the close of Annual Conference. At present most statements presented to Conference are still unaudited.

The Bishop commented that there was a different tone to Conference this year and that some important resolutions had been passed. He believed the Spirit was moving amongst us and pushing us into action. Nobody could fail to be impressed, too, by the true Methodist singing which lifted our spirits when business was heavy. The South Eastern District will organise next SMAC at P.Dickson.

On 13 November, a whole-day Retreat was held at the S.I.A. Bungalow at Mata Ikan.

The theme. 'Fulfilling the Mission of the Church', was a followup on the planning for the year carried out by the current L.C.E.C. at its first meeting for the year.

After an opening devotion led by Rev Christopher Smith, a series of short key addresses to set the tome for group discussions followed. These were delivered by Pastor, Mr Victor Goh and Mr Andrew Lee. The Retreat then went into workshop group discussion.

In the afternoon the groups re-assembled in plenary session. It was the unenviable task of the Moderator, Mr Peter Lai, to summarize the views expressed and recommendations made.

Briefly, the recommendations fell into two broad groupings:

1. Deepening the fellowship within the congregation.

All three workshops emphasised the importance of home visitation between church members as well as by the pastor, in strengthening congregational fellowship. Many suggestions went into detailed means of improving the warmth and quality of such fellowship e.g. by hospital visitation groups, formation of tightly-knit area groups, maintaining regular contact by phone, mailing birthday cards. The need for a more prayerful life both at church and at home was also stressed.

2. Reaching out to new communities.

The strategy envisaged was of teams trained for home visits first within Serangoon Gardens and then into Ang Mo Kic. One group also recommended church support for a full-time missionary either in Singapore or overseas.

Altogether some 40 members and friends attended the Retreat with more than half a dozen children. Catering needs were not forgotten, and were admirably met by Miss Lucy Lau and her team. Thanks are due to them. the moderator, speakers, registrars (Mr & Mrs Chan Chong Hiok) and to the many others who planned and ran the Retreat.

When the mystery of Life becomes a life, we begin to understand that the heart of the Divine is not power - a power than wonderfully protects or mightily manipulates our lives - but the helplessness of love, a helplessness that can do nothing until, in answer to that love, we put ourselves at his disposal. May the deepest message of this blessed season be (breath-catching thought!), that God needs me to make His presence felt in the world He loves?

What is so totally undogmatic as a Baby? Yet, speechless and powerless, it says with strange compulsion, "I AM WHAT I AM. I AM here." This Christmas it is as though the Babe of Bethlehem is asking, "What are you going to do with Me? Have you a place for me? May I come in?" God is showing us His face.

May His presence be with you and His love transform you through His Christmas coming.
