"I doubt that there is a more threatening subject than tithing. That which touches the wallets and purses taps a very sensitive nerve," writes R.T. Kendall the pastor of the famous Westminster Chapel, and author of the book, Tithing, A Call to Serious Biblical Giving.

To certain extent, Dr. Kendall is correct. The subject of tithing and pledging can be a very threatening topic to people whose life-style and value system revolve around self-enrichment and self-gratification. These people probably worship a god with the capital \$. No matter how much they have, even with increased income, they always complain that they don't have enough. To such people, tithing and pledging is indeed a threatening subject to be ignored, swept under the worn-out carpet to excuses, and conveniently explained away. When it comes to giving to charity or supporting the work of the Church their giving is often measured by the least they could afford.

Christ our Lord understands the foibles of mankind. He knows how easily it is for us to be blinded by the glitters of gold, and seduced by the intoxicating power of wealth. With the heart of the perfect Pastor, our Lord reminds us that whilst wealth is important, it should not replace God and His ministry in the altar of our life. In His wisdom He counsels:

"Do not store up riches for yourselves here on earth, where moths and rust destroy, and robbers break in and steal. Instead, store up riches for yourselves in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and robbers cannot break in and steal. For your heart will always be where your riches are." (Matt. 6:19-21).

In short, our Lord is saying, "Do not be possessed by your possessions."

On the other hand, Christians who have experienced the liberating power and love of God do not view tithing and pledging as something threatening. These Christians know their priority in life. They realise that ultimate satisfaction and meaning in life do not come from pursuit of self-enrichment and self-gratification, but from their pursuit of God's Kingdom and Righteousness (Matt. 6:33). To be able to seek God's Kingdom first is to free ourselves from the bondage of selfishness, and to liberate ourselves from the crippling tentacles of materialism.

Viewed correctly, material blessings are gifts from God. He has given us such blessings trusting us to manage them wisely. We are stewards given the responsibility to manage time, money and talent by God.

Why do Christians tithe?

We tithe because we want to be good and trustworthy stewards. We tithe because we want to get involved in the ministry of God and His Church. We tithe because it is a Biblical teaching. Above all, we tithe because we love God.

No one has become poor because he is a faithful steward. I have not come across any Christian who has become poor because of sacrificial and cheerful giving. Instead, when we begin to look around, Christians who have practised tithing and systematic giving are often blessed with abundant living.

August 5 is our Stewardship and Pledge Sunday. I invite you to dedicate your tithe and pledge on that day when you come for Communion.

MAF PROGRAMME

A most common lament in the MAF, and I am sure in the church itself, is when you hear adults say that they do not know how to pray. Just imagine - the most important aspect of a growing Christian's life, apart from Bible study is sadly lacking in the all-round development of a Christian.

The MAF got together to look into this problem and also discovered that

- we were in a prayer rut, praying for the same old things over and over again without seeing any results in our prayer life.
- we lacked a greater sense of fellowship when we prayed together.
- although we wanted other people to pray for us, we were not very good at remembering to pray for them.

The MAF then decided to deal with enriching our prayer life in our future meetings. We also felt that it was important to continue with our present format of Bible study and discussion in our meetings while we 'practise' praying. To meet these challenges the MAF has planned their programme for the next six months centred on studying biblical prayers by

- looking into the context surrounding each prayer
- observing the facts
- finding principles we can follow in each study
- and apply the biblical model when we pray together during the meeting.

In learning to pray for other people and to support and encourage each other in this personal Christian discipline, the MAF has also drawn up a format for each participant to spend about 20 minutes a day for Quiet Time with reference materials and guidelines to help in this activity.

We would therefore like to extend an invitation to all adults to join us at MAF meetings on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month at 8.00 p.m.

We pray that as God teaches us through Scripture and when the Holy Spirit works in us when we study, discuss and learn to pray together, we would experience more freedom and more fellowship with our Father and with each other.


WHAT TITHING MEANS TO ME







SOME INTERESTING THOUGHTS ON TITHING

Tithing is an Old Testament word. It means tenth a tenth of something: a tenth of the crop, a tenth of the money, a tenth of the grape harvest, a tenth of the land, or a tenth of the cattle, etc. The Old Testament Hebrews paid it with the regularity that we pay our income taxes, and with about as much spiritual meaning.

So when Jesus came to the scene he upgraded giving; instead of the tenth he demanded a new perspective on all of life. He commended that widow who gave all she had. He said nothing to the tithers. When the early Christians were being fed to the lions, Paul didn't talk about tithing either. But the New Testament didn't do away with the Old Testament standard; it simply upgraded it.

Now frankly, I'm not up to the New Testament standard yet. I'm too tightly tied to that which is around me. Perhaps someday, if I keep working at it, I will be able to live consistently on a New Testament level.

But I have discovered that I can reach the Old Testament level, and that is something. I can give a tithe. As a materialist talking to other materialists, tithing isn't farfetched at all. It's a good step to conquering our greed and selfishness.

There is no convenient time to start tithing. You certainly will not begin when you have all your bills paid. Something will always be left out. I hope it is not the Lord.

STEWARDSHIP AND PLEDGE SUNDAY

The Financial Year 1983/84 will end on 31.7.84. We thank God that we have been able to fulfil all our commitments for the Church Year, although we are now shouldering the responsibility of financing recurrent expenses and ensuring the completion of our vision project - Trinity Educational Centre.

The Stewardship and Finance Committee's Budget proposals for the new Financial Year 1984/85 have been accepted by the Local Church Executive Committee. The Budget reflects an increase in just over 8% from the 1983/84 Budget. The Finance Committee in working out the Budget, took into consideration the need to support TRAC programmes and budget. The Committee is aware of the additional challenges placed on our members to support the Trinity Educational Centre Project. However, our financial needs can be met when members begin to practise tithing, that is putting aside one-tenth of our income for God's work in and through the Church. We are also praying that members who have not pledged in the past will now come forward and pledge to give systematically and regularly. When more members give, our responsibility becomes lighter (Galatians 6:2), and we help to fulfil God's teaching.

Stewardship and Pledge Sunday will be observed on August 5, 1984. At the Worship Service, members and friends will be invited to offer their tithes and pledges for dedications as they approach the alter for Holy Communion.

The Pledge Treasurer will soon be sending out letters and Pledge cards to all members and friends of Trinity. With God as our help, we will meet the needs of His work on earth through prayerful, sacrificial, cheerful and systematic giving.

Please pray for the Stewardship and Pledge Sunday, and come prepared to give cheerfully.

TRINITY EDUCATIONAL CENTRE ____

PLEDGE SUNDAY

1st July 1984 was observed by the Church as PLEDGE SUNDAY for the TRINITY EDUCATIONAL CENTRE, BUILDING FUND.

Mr. P. Sathiasingam, Chairman of the Building Fund Committee, in launching the Pledge drive, informed the Congregation at both worship services, that the aim was to raise \$400,000 from within the Church membership for the start. He said, it was important to know our own commitment for this vision project which God has called us to shoulder. He urged the members and friends to give generously and sacrificially and through the Pledge Programme systematically. God in His wisdom has called us to collectively shoulder the responsibility to establish this \$1.5 million Education Centre

A total of 100 pledge cards were received at both the Morning and Evening services. The breakdown of support is as follows:

65 New pledges : \$110,464

16 Second time pledges : 37,335

19 Outright donations : 15,150 \$162,949

More members and friends are continuing to pray for this project. Some members have given us their verbal assurance of support in the future.

Mr. Seah Siow Kiang, Treasurer of the Building Fund Committee, estimated that to fulfil the project, the Church has to find yet another \$976,000. He is hopeful that more members would rally around to support the vision project.

MEMORIAL GIFTS

There have been some enquiries from members who are considering to give memorial gifts in the name of their 'Loved Ones'. The Building Fund Committee is already looking into this and assures the members that when the scheme is finalised, any amount previously contributed will be adjusted accordingly for their Memorial gift. Details will be announced soon.
