

Have you received the book-mark that gives you a two-month sermon calendar? Did you pick up a booklet called the "At Home Pack" from the ushers which gives you some ideas in following-up on the Sunday worship? Did you notice new logos in our church news bulletin?

They are all part of our new Christian Education curriculum which was started in January this year. Called "Whole People of God" or WPOG for short, it is designed to help us worship and learn as a whole, as one unit or body. The curriculum is applicable to all in the church from tod-dlers, children and youth to adults and seniors. Each week the same Bible theme will be the focus for Sunday worship, the Church school and even small groups.

However after receiving these pamphlets mentioned earlier, you may not have noticed any significant changes pertaining to our Sunday worship. The "Whole People of God" curriculum is designed following the Common Lectionary. We have been following the Common Lectionary for Sunday worship for the last three years. The lectionary is a schedule of scripture readings which help us to observe the Christian year and gives us a balanced study on the books and themes of the Bible. The Common Lectionary is observed by many churches; Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, Anglican and Methodist.

One important feature is that the lessons taught in the church school are in tandem with the preaching calendar. Similarly, some small groups are also studying on a topic that is similar to the theme preached on Sunday.

There are many great advantages in having such a Christian Education curriculum. Firstly, it helps integrate worship and education. It has always been difficult to bring our youth in Church school programmes to the more adult-type Sunday Worship service. We have one church but the two systems seem to run in different directions. Thus some youth in Church school feel uncomfortable and even lost during Worship services. We hope that sharing the same lectionary-based curriculum will facilitate the phasing-in of our youth from Church school to Sunday services.

Secondly, it enables the church to grow together. What brings us together? The WPOG draws us through a common curriculum of study and growth. We are all exposed to the same topic of Scripture each week. What is preached at the service is taught in Church school and discussed at small group meetings. The WPOG enables us to have a common ground for sharing and discussion.

Thirdly, it encourages family interaction. The child, parent and grand-parent are learning the same passages from the Scriptures each week. Families and extended families can share their Sunday experiences. You may ask your child or nephew about their Sunday's lesson and add what you learnt in the Worship service, The family can discuss their Sunday experience over lunch. The "At Home Pack" is a further step to help individuals and groups grow.

We have adopted this curriculum because of its potential in uniting us as one body; with a common focus, similar Scripture lessons and shared experiences. It is not a cure-all. The curriculum merely points the way for us. It remains for each of us to respond as faithful disciples of Jesus and build the "Body of Christ".

· · · Symbols of Easter

The existence of Easter eggs and bunnies has become a all too familiar sight at Easter. Few people are aware of the history behind Easter symbols. The egg has been an object of religious adoration symbolising the transition from non-existence to life. More importantly, the egg has been used as a symbol of resurrection. The egg is seen as a life giving tomb and the hatching chick as a representation of Christ's resurrection from the tomb.

The bunny came to be associated with Easter because it symbolises the moon, which is used to determine the date of Easter (Easter falls on the 1st Sunday after the first full moon). The helplessness of the rabbit also represents Man, whose only defence is Christ himself.

Few of us are aware however, that the origin and character of Easter came from old pagan influences. The worship of Tammuz (which was the worship of nature, life and reproduction), first used the egg as an appropriate symbol of life. The churches of the 3rd and 4th centuries adopted these practices(ie. "Christianised") to cater to the prejudices and customs of their heathen associates, with the hope to win the favour of the unconverted and bring them into the fold of the Church.

Despite this pagan origin, the symbols and traditions used at Easter today are long stripped of all paganistic connotations and are instead used as a rich symbol of the passion of Christ. Different cultures celebrate Easter with their own special traditions and symbols. In Greece, people paint and exchange crimson red eggs to honour the blood of Christ shed for sinful Man. In Germany and Austria however, the eggs are strangely not exchanged at Easter but are painted green and exchanged on Maundy Thursday to mark the last supper and the crucifixion of Christ.

In Russia, beautifully decorated porcelain eggs were linked with royalty. The intricate and precious masterpieces of Faberge were commissioned by the Tzars as presents within the royal household at Easter. The exchange of intricately decorated porcelain eggs is a fundamental component of Orthodox Easter tradition not only as a symbol of resurrection but of Christ's royalty and kingship. Romanians have a unique way of celebrating Easter. Their Easter tradition calls for the cleaning of houses, wearing of new clothes and the partaking of the ritual bath before going to church. These are used to signify a new beginning for mankind following the resurrection of Jesus Christ which promised the forgiveness of sins and the redemption of souls. Romanians also celebrate with a feast and painted eggs to mark the end of fasting and Lent.

No matter how Easter is celebrated in its many forms all over the world, the symbols used at Easter today serve as a rich reminder of the Saviour that was crucified and who died for the sins of all Mankind. They have come to represent for Christians all over the world the death, resurrection and the beginning of new life for Christians who have come to believe in Jesus Christ and who claim a new life in Him.
