The old sanctuary roof symbolised our tendencies to stay comfortable, and to live in the past. But God graciously sent the fire to remind us to step out of familiar grounds into risky lands for the sake of the Gospel. The new roof represents a new beginning. Serangoon Gardens today is not the same as Serangoon Gardens 47 years ago. We need to change. We need to pour "new wine into new wineskins" (Matthew 9:17). Come, let's move on, by faith. Let's get ready to go back to our new home.

# HE GAVE ME LIGHT!

My name is Wee Hian Chor, aged 47, married with 3 children. I was brought up in a family that worshipped idols. Taoism was our religion.

Whenever we were in trouble we would seek the help of mediums and be given talismans for protection. I remember how one of my brothers, who was constantly sick and unable to work, sought the help of a medium. The medium told him that he needed to be

a medium in order to be cured and so he became one. In time, he was told by the medium that every night he would have to go to the temple to carry out rituals so that people could seek help and give donations. My brother was

reluctant because he needed to work in the day and worried that he could not make it every night. This upset the medium and he cursed my brother saying that he would not have a smooth working life. True enough, he had no peace thereafter. He had constant headaches and was unable to work and his family despised him. He found his life miserable and, at times, wanted to give up. Thanks be to God that a Christian relative happened to find out about his condition and came forward to help. He and his family were brought to church and worshipped the Lord. Eventually he accepted Christ and was

Upon seeing what my brother had gone through, I lost faith in Taoism. I did not think of being a Christian at that time for I always felt that I should follow my mother's beliefs. She became a Buddhist after my brother's incident. Also, in the later part of my working life, I came to learn more about Buddhism through my immediate boss who was the YMBA chairman. He brought me to a Sri Lanka Buddhist Temple to learn more about this religion.

Then came year 2003 when I was diagnosed with colon cancer. I went through an operation to remove the tumour. During the operation, the surgeon found that the cancer had spread into my lymph node and was classified as stage 4. The surgeon told me that I needed further medical treatment and referred me to an Oncologist. I was put on 6 cycles of oral chemotherapy. This lasted for 6 months. During this period of time, I constantly visited the Buddhist temple to chant

> and pray, hoping that my sickness would be cured. After the 6 months, I was able to go back to work. However, 3 months later, there was a reoccurrence of my sickness and the cancer had spread to my stomach

lining, causing a serious bloating in my tummy. I was unable to drink and eat properly. My sister, Alice, and my brother-in-law, Png, suggested I follow them to a Christian healing session and listen to other testimonies. The following week on Friday I followed them. During the session, Brother Yan prayed for me and through God's words he told me that my colon was very red and that God had cleansed it. Throughout the

healing session I could see a Cross appearing in my head. That night I accepted Christ, and brother Yan encouraged me to attend TMC's services which I did the following Sunday.

It was already late afternoon


when I went home after that Sunday's service. After settling down, I decided to read my Bible that was given to me by my sister. I proceeded to my room and closed the door. My son was also in the room playing on his own. As it was rather dark in the room I switched on the room light and the wall light behind the bed. This wall light had two bulbs and one of them had not been working for quite some time. As I began to read my Bible, suddenly, the light that had not been working lighted up and this was witnessed by my son. Praise the Lord that he gave me light! After reading the Bible I tried switching on and off the wall light but the one that had began to work again just minutes ago, failed to light up. I shared this with the rest of my family including my sister, Alice. It was through this amazing incident that I decided to get rid of all the idols in my house and accepted Christ fully.

The following week, Pastor Kai Ming, together with other brothers and sistersin-Christ, came to my house. They prayed for my whole family and helped us to clear all the idols and chanting books. Thereafter, many brothers and sistersin-Christ came forward to pray for me and my family. I felt that I was never alone in praying - this was unlike when I was a Buddhist. I have received so much care and concern from TMC Pastors, brothers and sisters-in-Christ. Especially Pastor Kai Ming who frequently called me to ask about my condition and Brother Yan who prayed for me day and night. I no longer feel bloated and am gaining strength day

> by day. It is the constant prayers from brothers and sisters-in-Christ that I am where I am today.

God was also very kind to me. I received unexpected gifts to help

me financially when I lost my job. Even though I am still under treatment for my sickness, I have strong faith that I will be fully healed by our mighty God who has shown so much love for me and my family. Thanks be to God and

Saltshaker interviewed Mr Sim Cher Khee, Chairman of Prayer and Intercession Committee to find out more about its work:

Q: What does the Prayer and Intercession committee set out to do?

A: The committee aims to communicate three main messages. Firstly, while most would agree that prayer is important, there is a need to reclaim the priority of prayer. Secondly, prayer is a two-way communication with God – when we pray, we talk and listen to Him. And thirdly, by praying, we always participate in God's greater purposes, as Christ did in his Gethsemane prayer (Matt 26:36-46).

The desire of the committee is to see that all at TMC develop their individual prayer lives, that homes and households establish time for family devotions and prayer, and that the church becomes a praying church – praying for church leaders, church ministries, the members in need and for missions. In Acts 13:3, we see that the church prayed and fasted for Barnabas and Saul before they left for their missionary journeys.

Q: What are some of the Committee's plans?

A: We have identified four 'Pillars' of prayer revival, namely: convicted leadership, teaching on prayer, practice of prayer, and multiplying prayer leadership and workers.

Under convicted leadership, we want to see pastors and leaders lead by example for

prayer and revival. In practical terms, this could be attending the Wednesday (2nd and 4th in the month) or Friday (weekly) prayer meetings. Pastors could also teach on prayer at the LCEC prayer meetings while the leaders could pray for the pastors and the various ministries' needs.

For teaching on prayer we are looking at various avenues, such as conducting prayer workshops, using the pulpit ministry for teaching on prayer topics, and encouraging

everyone to attend the International Prayer Conference (IPC).

Practice of Prayer would entail the ongoing mobilisation of TMC for prayer, be it at the weekly prayer meetings, the TMC prayer net or prayer chains to support special church

events. We also organise prayer teams to visit church members

who are unable to come to church on Sundays for worship. The sharing of testimonies - through the pulpit, church bulletin, Saltshaker and emails - on how God answers prayers will also spur us on in our faith and prayer life.

In terms of multiplying prayer leadership and workers, the Committee will challenge everyone in TMC to

attend the prayer workshop in May. We also target to have a total of 50 children, youths, adults and seniors to attend the IPC sessions in June and we will work with the other committees, like WSCS and the Seniors Ministry, to do home visitations and prayer.

Q: What are some challenges faced by the Committee?

A: The first major challenge is in convincing our TMC members that prayer is vital for an intimate relationship with our Heavenly Father. As Singaporeans generally have a hectic schedule, the

other major challenge is getting people to set aside time to come together to pray for the church and for one another.

Q: What are some steps we can take to participate in the church's prayer life?

A: For those who would like to pray for personal needs and healing, they should attend the weekly Friday Prayer Fellowship. On the other hand, members who would like to pray for the needs of the church as well as for one another can join in the Wednesday

Prayer meeting. We also have an email system in place called the TMC Prayer Net for those who would like to pray 'virtually' for other members or friends. All they need to do is to give us their email address and they will be kept informed of prayer requests that need their

prayer support. Currently, there are about 100 members on the Net. We have just started our visitations to the sick who are at home or in hospital. Any member who needs our Committee to visit their family/friends can always contact the church office.

Q: Any other thoughts about prayer that you would like to share with the church?

A: There is no need for us to worry. God is faithful to respond to our every need and request. We, His children, are loved by the Heavenly Father whose nature is constant, never-changing. He is always merciful, forgiving, loving, all powerful and his plan for us is always perfect. We are therefore urged, according to a Christian writer, to simply pray: "Lord, I come now not just to have my needs met – needs You have foreseen and are eager to supply. No, I come to meet Your needs!"

"We were made to fellowship with him – even in our heaviest times. Do we love to be with him? Do we prefer Him above all others? Does our heart cry out: 'Jesus, You are my everything. You are my soul's great pleasure – and I love Your company?' "

May the Lord put in us a heart that is easily wooed to God's presence, listening closely to God's voice and putting all our confidence in His Word.

# A UNIQUE LIFE by Jeannie Chee



When I was asked to interview Seok Eng, my immediate thought was that it was going to be one of those typical interviews - I would get typical responses about the life of a typical missionary. I was, however, pleasantly surprised when I finally spoke to Seok Eng. Not only was she responsive and warm and very open with her sharing but she clearly proved to be an extremely unique individual

with a very unique ministry.


As you may already know, Seok Eng has been a missionary for about 13 years. She started off with church work at Fairfield Methodist Church as a member of the ministry staff and eventually branched out into full-time missionary work. She is definitely very passionate about her work as evidenced by how she chatters excitedly about the years she spent in various parts of China, sharing the gospel and equipping the church leaders and pastors with a better grasp of the Word. Seok Englists community development amongst the tribal people as one of her most fulfilling experiences. She was part of a team that helped build cables, dams, bridges and reservoirs as part of reaching out to the various tribes. This experience was particularly rewarding as initially there was much resistance amongst the tribal people against wanting to know about the Gospel. Nevertheless, putting their faith in Jesus and trusting entirely on his providence, Seok Eng and her team finally succeeded in reaching out to the tribes.

As a missionary in China, Seok Eng had to get used to the poor sanitary conditions and the rough living conditions. She also had to move from place to place often at very short notice. Judging from her soft-spoken nature, one would have hardly guessed that Seok Eng can live without the modern comforts of life that most of us are used to. When asked how she sustained such rough and tough conditions, Seok Eng attributes it to God's protection. She fervently believes in the power of prayer and told me that it was prayers from her family and friends at home that saw her through even the worst of her time in China. She recalls that she was once caught in a heavy flood which had

resulted in a number of fatalities. The flood waters were highly contaminated and she saw dead animals being swept away by the swift currents. Most of the people who came into contact with the flood waters suffered severe skin problems. Wading for days in the flood waters: she even had to eat the crops that were caught

by the waters, out of sheer hunger. Miraculously, she did not suffer from skin problems that typically afflicted flood victims. She attributes this miracle to God who answered the prayers of her family and friends.

Not only was Seok Eng responsive and warm and very open with her sharing but she clearly proved to be an extremely unique individual with a very unique ministry.



Seok Eng is currently employed as a lay ministry staff of our church. The work she will do will revolve around pastoral care. She will be involved in many aspects of TMC's ministries such as the Discipleship programme, membership classes, baptism classes, marriage counselling and missions training. She

# OUTREACH TO PLMGS(P)

The Primary 5 girls from Paya Lebar Methodist Girls' School (Primary) looked wide-eyed as we told them that they were going to be blindfolded. "Where are you guys going to bring us to?" they kept asking, some trying to peer over to sneak a look at what was happening ahead.

This was the beginning of the "Black station", a station illustrating the darkness of sin. The girls were blindfolded and led to the beginning

of a "tunnel", a maze made out of tables with black cloth draping down. Shrieks of protest came from some of the girls as they heard about the tunnel and we had to assure them that all would be fine. "Are you sure there are no spiders and cockroaches inside?" many of the girls asked warily.

This experience however helped to illustrate the darkness of sin and the fear that came from being in the dark and many looked reflective as the message of how sin causes us to walk in darkness was shared.

This creative concept of using colours to explain the gospel of Christ was a great hit with the girls. Each station was fun yet meaningful. The activities ranged from decorating the "Green station" with flowers and materials to looking for a box of "gold" at the "Yellow station".

As the girls went through the different stations, white, black, green, yellow and red, the message of the gospel was being planted. They learned how man, who was initially pure had sinned and fallen short of God's glory and how only through His blood can a relationship be restored, growth in Christ take place and a place in Heaven secured.

As the message of God's love was shared to all by Dr Hum at their final station in the hall, many of the girls were touched, with 47 girls wanting to receive Christ. Indeed, praise God for that!

On the second night, a campfire was held where the girls sang, cheered and danced along to campfire songs. As each class sent two mascots up, their creativity was put to the test as they dressed up their mascots. The finale of the night was the presentation of their class cheers. The classes pitted themselves against each other in terms of both creativity and loudness of their cheers.

As the night drew to an end, sparklers were given out and the girls sang the closing songs for the campfire. Indeed, memories of the Primary 5 camp would continue to linger in the girls and it is our prayer that the seed of the gospel sown would reside and bear fruit in time to come.


























# Vespers at Chen Su Lan

Methodist Children's Home

Ringing laughter slowly ebbed away, as Ms Grace George attempted once more to regain the children's short-lived attention. She was content that the children were happy so long as they allowed her small group members

to finish the skit on Bartimaeus- the blind man who was healed by Jesus.

Rather fortunately, the skit was allowed to run its course and thereafter, the

children got to reprise the roles of the characters in the skit - much to the merriment of the rascally audience. A short quiz followed; it was heartening to note that some of the children had remembered various little details of the skit and for every correct answer each child gave, he or she was rewarded with a pen. At the end of the quiz, every child received gifts of sweets and pens irrespective of whether he or she has answered any questions - life is plain not fair.

Clearly, maintaining order in a room seated with a score of children, aged 4 to 14, from Chen Su Lan Methodist Children's Home was a job hair-raising enough, even for any riot policeman. Indeed, there was not one adult accustomed to the children's high levels of unwearied animation. In the midst of the skit, some of the younger children had not the slightest inkling of what was going on and so they turned fretful, proving to be a handful for some members of the small group. It remains a mystery, where all the children got their Duracell™ bunny capabilities. The effect of their fiendish energies was never more apparent during the time of worship earlier on: the children's raucous bellows had drowned that rather discomfited

worship leader's voice. Curiously enough, one of the small group members who teaches in Trinity Methodist Church's (TMC) children ministry wished that her less responsive charges can be the same.

Every third Friday of the month, from 8 to 9 p.m., a group from TMC, mainly from the Serangoon North SG, will conduct vespers for the children of the home. These sessions are meant to be used as a time

of devotion for the children. Normally, the volunteers are given a free hand in what they wish to do for vespers. The group had decided that prayers and worship should be de rigueur. The skit was a first.

Chen Su Lan Methodist
Children's Home is one
of TMC's 'social
concerns'. The Home
sits on 202 Serangoon
Garden Way and
provides salubrious
living conditions for
children, whose families
are indisposed to care for

them. The families of the children often possess one or more of these traits: single-parent, low-income, and parents being held in custodial institutions. The children have normal primary school education and attend schools in the vicinity. The Home hopes to provide purposeful intervention for the children and their parents - who have many needs and unresolved problems - so that these children can integrate with their families one day. The Home has another purpose: as a child-care centre, it caters to children aged 3 to 6 from the neighbourhood community as well as disadvantaged families. Additional services such family-life



education, before and after-school care (BASC), public education, volunteer training and development, are provided.

5 children from the Home also attend church every Sunday to join the 'Thank God It's Sunday' (TGIS) programme under the care of part-time church worker, Ms Susan Chua. It was not too long ago too, that Pastor Lai Kai Ming assigned the church caretaker, Mr Chua, to the home every Wednesday for cleaning and gardening.

Traditionally and faithfully,
TMC has contributed to the home in other areas. As teachers, six ladies from TMC gave free tuition classes weekly; as loving aunties and uncles, the Hougang small group organised monthly birthday

The Choice' cakes for the children; as Santa Clauses, various helpers organise a social outing every December. These outings are a rare opportunity for the children to watch movies and receive presents in the form of toiletries, games and alarm clocks.



TOUCHING LIVES

Besides Chen Su Lan Methodist
Children's Home, the Outreach and Social
Concerns (OSC) Committee has other
social concerns that fall within its
purview. TMC has helped out at the
Pelangi Home for the destitute and
mentally unsound for sixteen years. A
precursor to Woodbridge Hospital, the
Home has one female and four male
dormitories. The activities of the TMC
volunteers have been confined to the
female dormitories. Due to fears of
Severe Atypical Respiratory Syndrome

(SARS), fortnightly social visits to the Home were discontinued after March 2003, to allow the Home to minimise physical contact with outsiders.

In the last two years, OSC committee chairperson, Mr William Chua, has seen an unprecedented growth in social outreach programmes – the new initiatives at Chen Su Lan Methodist Children's Home exemplifies that and more of such examples abound. One of them is the truly laudable commitment of 6 TMC members, towards 6 needy families outside the church. These families were referred

to the pastors, by

members of the congregation and the church members help look into their needs. Yet another example is the 'Befrienders' programme, by which Mr William Goh and Mr Kelvin Tan's groups, along with some other individuals, mentor 5 Paya Lebar Methodist Girls School (PLMGS) girls. Also, bursaries amounting up to \$300, for textbooks, were given to 9

PLMGS girls on 9th
January, this year. Finally,
in the last three years, TMC
has been active in
Methodist Welfare Services
(MWS) flag-days. Last year,
in September, 100 TMC
participants raised
\$150,000. This year, the
Flag Day will be held on
24th April.

Social concerns in TMC have begun to

expand into the world domain. A month ago, Mr William Chua had been casting about for volunteers for relief crisis teams. Such teams require healthcare volunteers such as doctors, nurses and

ancillary workers such as cooks and construction personnel. To date, 3 volunteers from TMC have responded to this call. Under the auspices of the Ministry of Defence and the Red Cross, the teams hail from different corporate and religious organisations.

There are many pairs of hands at work in TMC to reach out to the infirm and to those with

infirm and to those with socio-economic difficulties. These acts

of kindness, are not without returns. The activities at Chen Su Lan have illustrated that high degree of reciprocity: to the volunteers, the learning process is ongoing and is a

good tonic for the restless. It is a rare gift indeed, for anyone who lives in this pyramidal society, to be totally at ease with people of any segment in the social spectrum. In the New Testament, Jesus was egalitarian and was thus able to sow spiritual seeds anywhere.

Many in TMC have been able to commit themselves to social concerns despite their very busy schedules. Typically, these people have families and equally typically, they have stressful jobs that may require them to travel a fair bit. Drawing on Mr



William Chua's musings about TMC as a growing church – is it a mere coincidence that social concerns has expanded at such an unprecedented scale before TMC moves back to Serangoon Garden Way? Is it then possible to have everyone in the social spectrum, to be of one voice in their praise of GOD in the new premises? Is foreign worker outreach involving Pakistanis, Chinese and Bangladeshis possible?

'Religion that our God accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world' (James 1:27). Let us reach out with new eyes.

# TMC Resource Centre goes mobile!



One canteen table, one laptop and three mobile shelves of books – that's all there is to the current make-up of our resource centre...

Since the move to Paya Lebar Methodist Girls' School (Primary) last year, like many activities from the other ministries, we face the challenge of continuing our resource centre operations. This challenge proves even bigger with our logistical needs such as storage area for books, book shelves for display and a proper recording system for the loans. While we tried to sort out these issues, the resource centre stopped operating.

A few months after the move, we managed to find three mobile bookshelves. Though a little old and shaky, they certainly displayed great potential as to what they can help us do. Our RC members then spent some time picking out a few hundred books and CDs/VCDs to open up for loan again. Due to space constraints, and the need to cater to members of all ages, the selection of titles is rather limited at the moment

-we have focused on pushing out the more popular materials.

With this new arrangement, our temporary resource centre began its operations once again, twice monthly on the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the month.

Occupying a little corner in the canteen each time, the setup always requires the RC members to painstakingly push out the three heavy, mobile bookshelves. Then there is the passing around of the laptop, amongst the RC members on duty, for recording loan transactions. The desire to serve certainly drives us to overcome many of these difficulties.

Thankfully, the efforts paid off. It didn't take us long to 'lure' back many of our regulars from the good old days. The children, once again, proved to be our most supportive 'customers'.


For the time being, the titles selection for the materials on loan is kept small for obvious logistical reasons. For the actual volume of books that the resource centre currently owns, there are about: 3,000+ adult books, 3,500+ children books, 60+ VCDs and 1,000+ video/audio tapes. Look out for this full range when we move back to the new resource centre.





An auction of photo prints and paintings was held over the New Year's Eve dinner at Paya Lebar Methodist Girls' School (Primary) canteen, just before the 2003 Watchnight Service.

About 80 church members and friends attended the dinner. It was a wonderful time of feasting and fellowshipping with one another.

The auction was a great success and in just an hour of bidding, \$\$9800 was raised for the TMC Redevelopment Project. Five photo prints and two paintings of TMC were sold to the highest bidders. Four of the seven sold were donated back to the church for future displays in the new building.

The photo prints are the works of a dear brother-in-Christ, Mr. Daniel T.S. Kon, whose life was met with many trials. At the age of 14, his father was admitted into a mental institution. He, being the only child, had to earn his keep – paying his school fees and supporting his mother. He became a successful book publisher in the region, got married and raised a family of five children.

His life took a turn for the worse in 1996 when he had to undergo two major

operations, was admitted into the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) twice, and later suffered bouts of depression and extreme anxiety.

In the next few months of his recuperation, God ministered to Mr. Kon. He simply surrendered himself to God

and was reconciled with his Creator. He has written two books, entitled "A Ray of Hope" and "Blessings," to share with others his testimonies.

His love for photography was basically to show the world the intimacy between us,



nature and our Creator – his style is more conceptual and interpretative, rather than documentary. Mr. Kon does not sell his photo prints but he donates them to churches and organisations mainly for fundraising purposes.

The paintings of TMC were done by two children from the Grace Haven Home. It was an idea by Mr. Siva Subramaniam, a friend of Mrs. Patricia Tan of the 11am choir, who visited TMC last year and heard about the redevelopment project. He decided to play a part in raising funds for the church.

Being an active sponsor for activities in the home, Mr Subramaniam, who is the Vice-President of Avaya Singapore Pte Ltd, got the children to do the paintings. He bought them when they were completed and

donated the artworks to the church for the auction.

We thank God for the lives and ministries of our dear brothers-in-Christ. Their generous donations have truly shown TMC how God can work in many ways in blessing the church.


